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HONORING CEREMONY IN MEMORY OF TWO ALUMNI

On December 12, 2024, the Department of OBS/GYN and AUB community at large gathered to celebrate the lives of two esteemed physicians, Drs. Roland Tannous and Ralph Papas, who left us at the peak of their careers and yet will always be remembered for their dedication to medicine and their lasting impact on the lives they touched during their short yet fruitful journey.

In his inaugural speech, AUB President Fadlo R. Khuri stressed on the importance of philanthropy and collective effort in achieving goals and preserving legacies.

Drs. Tannous and Papas "were not just physicians; they were compassionate leaders, genuine innovators, and tireless advocates for better patient care," he stated. Dean of the Faculty of Medicine and Vice President for Medical Affairs Raymond Sawaya highlighted the fact that both physicians "embodied the values of excellence in healthcare that AUB strives to instill in its students and trainees," and thanked Dr. Anwar Nassar for being the engine behind this initiative.

An emotional documentary was then projected that included very touching testimonies from family members and friends, who reflected on the human aspect and fine qualities of Drs. Tannous and Papas. It was even more touching to those in the audience who knew that December 12 was the birthday of Dr. Papas.

The ceremony was concluded by Dr. Anwar Nassar, chairperson of the Department of OBS/GYN, who announced the establishment of two endowed awards in the names of the late physicians. These awards will be distributed annually to stellar OBS/GYN residents who have demonstrated excellence in research or teaching and who exemplify the core values that Drs. Tannous and Papas embodied. Certificates were then distributed to Dr. Lara Nahouli, the recipient of the Dr. Roland Jamil Tannous Award, and Dr. Joanna Khalifeh, the recipient of the Dr. Ralph Said Papas Award. These awards were the result of a concerted effort of Dr. Tannous and Dr. Papas' friends, families, colleagues, and classmates who joined together independently to establish those two awards to celebrate their lives and ensure that they will always be remembered at their alma mater. A final word of gratitude goes to those who helped make these awards a reality, and a special thank you to Dr. Rani Sarkis, a classmate of Dr. Papas who was the

driving force behind establishing the award in his name.











PATHWAY TO BOARD CERTIFICATION



Dr. Marco Mouannes (OBS/GYN '20) shares his story as the first graduate from our program who became eligible to certification by the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology (ABOG) without having to repeat his residency in the US.

Dr. Mouannes admits that "joining an ACGME-I accredited program strongly influenced my decision to pursue my residency at AUBMC." At the time, there was no certainty about the potential benefits of the ACGME-I accreditation, but the process was underway.

While doing his fellowship in Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility in New York, he was informed by Dr. Labib Ghulmiyyah, the former residency program director, that the ABOG had approved an alternative board certification pathway for graduates of ACGME-I accredited programs. This pathway includes the following requirements:

- Graduation from a four-year ACGME-I accredited residency program
- Full ECFMG certification
- Obtaining unrestricted admission privileges in both OBS/GYN at a US-based hospital (not a private center) for at least two years (excluding fellowship training)
- Active medical license in the US for at least two years (any state)
- · Three letters of recommendation from board-certified OBS/GYNs who have worked closely with the candidate
- Achieving OBS/GYN accreditation in the candidate's country of training (i.e. registered as an active OBS/GYN member of the Lebanese Order of Physicians)

Once these criteria are met, the candidate submits an online application, which is reviewed in a monthly board meeting. Upon approval, the candidate becomes eligible to take the written qualifying exam (QE) of the ABOG. After passing the QE, candidates have up to eight years to sit for the certifying exam (CE), which involves submitting cases (OBS, GYN, and office-based) for oral evaluation. While the pathway itself is straightforward, meeting the criteria can be challenging. The biggest hurdles are obtaining a license to practice medicine in the US and securing hospital admission privileges. "In my case, I was fortunate enough to obtain active medical licenses in both New York and Connecticut, as well as secure an attending position in Connecticut by June 2021, just a 45-minute commute from New York, all while completing my fellowship," Dr. Mouannes states. He submitted his application in September 2023, passed the QE in July 2024, and is expected to sit for the CE in October 2025. "Without a doubt, graduating from an ACGME-I accredited OBS/GYN program at AUBMC has been a transformative opportunity that has set me on the path to ABOG. The training I received at AUBMC, as well as the mentorship and leadership of our faculty, are on par with, if not superior to, many programs I have encountered here in the US," Dr. Mouannes concluded.


















CELEBRATING A MENTOR WHO MAKES A DIFFERENCE

RESIDENTS' NEWS

Dr. Alaa Daher (PGY 4) participated in the 53rd Annual Global Congress on Minimally Invasive Gynecological Surgery (MIGS) that was held on November 16–19, 2024 in New Orleans, US, accompanied by Dr. Nabil El Khoury. This renowned event provided an invaluable opportunity to explore the latest innovations and groundbreaking research in the field. It also fostered connections with global experts, offering a dynamic environment for professional growth.

Dr. Ali Safadi (PGY 3) gave a lecture on November 15, 2024, to displaced pregnant women about key pregnancy milestones and warning signs to watch for. This was part of an initiative by the WISH Program aimed to empower patients with essential knowledge to ensure a safer pregnancy and timely access to care.





PROVIDING FREE HEALTHCARE TO DISPLACED WOMEN

In response to the ongoing humanitarian crisis caused by the Israeli War on Lebanon, the Department of OBS/GYN, with support from HER Fund and as part of the initiative launched by the Primary Health Care Center at the Department of Family Medicine, in collaboration with the Ministry of Public Health, started offering free healthcare services to displaced women. Starting on October 26, 2024, and running through December 14, 2024, weekly Saturday clinics were held. These clinics, staffed by AUBMC OBS/GYN attendings with support from residents, nursing students, and members of the OBS/GYN Interest Group (OGIG), offered free services that included prenatal checkups, well-woman screenings (Pap smears and mammograms), and care for a variety of gynecological conditions.

The clinics also addressed broader challenges, such as period poverty, by distributing sanitary pads to displaced women to help manage menstrual hygiene. Several patients are also benefiting from the significantly reduced cost of delivery (less than 50 percent of the original cost). This initiative was made possible through HER Fund, a charitable organization supporting women with critical healthcare needs, and through the unwavering backing of AUBMC's leadership. Their commitment ensured the success of this program and underscored the institution's dedication to serving vulnerable populations.

The overwhelming turnout, which doubled from the first to the second session, reflected the significant need for these services and the community's appreciation for this effort. This program highlights the collective efforts of all involved to provide much-needed care and support for displaced women in Lebanon.













WISH PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

During the past few months, the WISH Program team was very active and conducted several activities:

- A total of 15 sessions for 402 healthcare providers on sexual rights, inclusivity, gender equity, and sexual health. The team also conducted 42 training sessions in shelters, reaching to 596 individuals, addressing displaced people on issues on self-care, personal hygiene, menstrual health, community support, and infections.
- Under the crisis, and as director of WISH Program, Dr. Faysal El Kak conducted eight training sessions on sexual reproductive issues at times of conflict reaching out to around 2,500 healthcare providers.
- Training 10 young people as "champions" to act as community support workers among the displaced community in 12 shelters, in collaboration with OXFAM.
- Collaborated with the Asfari Institute for Civil Society and Citizenship at AUB on WISH Asfari Talk Series (WAITS) and hosted two international speakers.
- As part of the cervical cancer elimination and HPV vaccination project, the WISH team has reached out to more than 700 students and AUB staff through participatory sessions and outdoor activities.

Dr. Anwar Nassar was invited to review three research proposals submitted to the Medical Research Center at Hamad Medical Corporation. These proposals tackled topics within the field of his expertise. He also participated in the virtual Consensus Meeting titled "Innovations in postpartum hemorrhage management," that was organized by Organon and was held virtually on October 31, 2024.

As a member of the Arab Board and as an elected member of the Maternal Fetal Medicine–Arab Board Division, Dr. Ihab Usta was invited to a two–day meeting in Amman, Jordan, to discuss the criteria for establishing a fellowship program in a specific center including number of beds, qualifications of supervisors, a fully organized fellowship program, and educational activities. A new meeting will be set soon to prepare questions for fellows for OSCE and a written and oral examination.

A: I would visit Spain because of its blend of cultural richness, natural beauty, and vibrant lifestyle.

Q: What do you enjoy doing during your free time?

A: Spending quality time with my kids and cooking. Trying out new recipes and sharing meals with family and friends is something I find enjoyable.
